Dear AFRP Supporters,

Ten years ago this June, a handful of people had a dream. AFRP founders Monica Rua, Kelly Lehrian, Dave Lehrian and Lee Hulquist wanted to ensure a different destiny for the homeless pets crowding local shelters. They wanted to find loving, permanent homes for the adoptable dogs and cats that would otherwise be euthanized at local shelters. They wanted to make a positive difference and provide a service that could galvanize our community.

Today, over 11,500 adopted dogs and cats later, the dream that started as a makeshift rescue group out of a garage has blossomed into an organization that has provided hope and life for thousands of homeless cats and dogs. AFRP is strong and growing with hundreds of dedicated volunteers, a wonderful adoption center in Pacific Grove, and several satellite locations. We now have a dream to add another adoption center in Santa Cruz!

In this issue, we celebrate our past and look to the future. Twenty-one junior volunteers represented AFRP in the Pacific Grove Good Old Days parade in April-- young people who will continue to advocate for animals as they become young adults. Lola the skateboarding bulldog led the parade and delighted the onlookers!

We have several upcoming events planned in celebration of our 10th anniversary. Enjoy music, beer, wine, food and raffle items at AFRP's Paws for a Cause at Hidden Valley Music in Carmel Valley July 19th. We'll also be holding an Open House June 5th at our AFRP Adoption Center in Pacific Grove, sponsored by the Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce. LIFE LINK Saves Lives

The AFRP van, nicknamed the "Rescue Waggin'," was on the road nearly every week in 2007, transporting nearly 400 at-risk dogs from local shelters and taking them to animal welfare organizations throughout Northern California. Though AFRP was able to take over 600 dogs into its own adoption program in 2007, more dogs needed help. That's where the Life Link Transportation Program came in. By partnering with similar organizations in other cities, we have been able to dramatically increase the number of animals we can help.

Our networking efforts have paid off, and now several groups AFRP regularly partners with, including the San Francisco SPCA and the Milo Foundation, make regular trips to Monterey County Animal Services and Salinas Animal Services in order to evaluate and pull dogs for their organizations. This enables the AFRP Rescue Waggin' to transport even more animals to other groups, where they get a second chance to find adoptive families.

With gas prices on the rise, we are in need of prepaid gas cards and donations to keep our Life Link transportation program thriving. With your help, we can continue to go that extra mile for dogs and cats that need our help. Let us know if you would like to become involved with this lifesaving program!

Foreclosures

Foreclosures are on the rise nationally - a most troublesome and dramatic trend. At the same time, in some parts of the nation pet abandonment is up 50%.

Animal abandonment is a misdemeanor according to California Penal Code Section 597.1, though it is not enforced on a regular basis.

Recently, Beau, a 7 year-old blind yellow lab mix, was reported to animal control by a neighbor in Hollister after being abandoned by his family. Fortunately, the staff at the Hollister Shelter contacted Animal Friends Rescue Project to help Beau so he would not be euthanized. Beau is blind and a little underweight, but otherwise healthy and getting his wag back. Beau really needs a forever home.

The loss of a home can result in tragedy for pets left behind. AFRP as always is here to help. Although AFRP does not take animals directly from the public, there are two programs in place to help. For more information, check out our Stay at Home Rescue Program and Compassionate Surrender Program on our website.

Help prevent pet victims of abandonment and contact your local animal welfare agency if you know of an abandoned pet. **Be an advocate!**

HOT DOG? !

Hot, cold, foggy, rainy. What if you only had one outfit and it was a fur coat? That's pretty much all your dog has. A fur coat without a zipper!

Each year dogs, and sometimes cats, die in cars that owners left for just a minute. Your car can be like a greenhouse with slanted windows and no ventilation. The inside of your car can be 10 to 20 degrees hotter than outside temperatures. Since dogs (and cats) don't sweat, their temperatures can jump 10 degrees in a matter of 2 or 3 minutes, 20 degrees in 10 minutes. Discomfort, panting, whining, foaming at the mouth, convulsions and seizures are all signs of heat prostration, which if not treated rapidly, can kill an animal.

If you find a dog that appears to have suffered from heat prostration, place it in the shade. You can place damp towels over them, but change these often as they may become very hot as heat is lost from the body. Immediately transport to a vet, even if the pet seems better. With quick actions you may be able to save a suffering animal.
